	A request to Navigo for information on what targeted work was in place to reach people most in need of mental health services, hence aiming to reduce health inequalities.		Update as at 8.12.22: Many services and campaigns led by Navigo target specific groups likely to be more at risk of mental ill health, or less likely to seek support. Examples are the partnership with Grimsby Town Football Club (GTFC) around men's mental health, their SHOUT text-based services to reach marginalised groups, their LGBT support group (called 'Inclusion'), and various employment services. In terms of geographical inequalities, Navigo data does show a greater prevalence of mental health issues within higher areas of deprivation, and they are currently doing some focused analysis to gain information which will allow them to target their services more specifically.

Appointments and scans A partner or one other person, such as a family member or friend, is able to accompany you for support at all antenatal appointments in the community or hospital if your partner is unable to attend.

			Maternity inpatients
			A partner <b>or</b> one other person, such as a family member or friend, can accompany you for support if you're staying on the maternity unit at any point during your pregnancy. They're welcome between 9am and 9pm, however, this does not currently extend to other visitors. A second birth partner is welcome during labour and birth. If it's a caesarean birth, only one birth partner can accompany you.  Visiting times are from 2pm to 4pm and 6pm to 8pm on the antenatal and postnatal wards at Scunthorpe and on the maternity wards at Grimsby.  It is strictly a <b>maximum of two visitors</b> at any one time. Your own children are also welcome to visit during visiting hours.  Your birth partner(s) and any other visitors are expected to wear a face mask unless exempt. This does not apply to children.
